Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,

There is a funny story about a guy that tried to rob a church. He went to the office, thinking there would be a huge pile of cash from the Sunday offering (LOL) and demanded that the pastor turn it over. Since there was no cash, he agreed to let the clergyman write a check instead. Of course, when the would-be burglar tried to cash the check, he was immediately arrested! Justice!

We love hearing about stories when bad or mean people get their comeuppance. But we love the good stories, too! An unknown and struggling singer finally gets a chance to perform on *America's Got Talent*, or one of the similar shows, and knocks it out of the park! The crowd goes wild!

We love it when good things happen to good people. We love it when bad things happen to bad people. But what do we do when bad things happen to good people? When a hurricane or tornado rips through a populated area, many people will often speculate that the devastation and horror are somehow related to God's judgment on a sinful people. They must have deserved it somehow, or so the thinking goes. Still others see the wreckage and claim it as proof that there is no God, because how could a good God allow such undeserved misery?

In Jesus' day, there was also a national tragedy that had people reeling and looking for meaning. Recorded in Luke 13:1-9, some people came to the temple to worship and were killed there by Roman soldiers. Imagine you were part of the congregation when a gunman entered the sanctuary and opened fire. How could you go back there to worship, knowing exactly where blood was shed and where your friends died? How could you sing songs of joy there? How could you sing songs of forgiveness? How could you listen to a sermon about God's sovereignty?

So it was in Jerusalem, and the people struggled to understand. Some thought that it was God's judgment; these people must have done something really bad because God didn't accept their sacrifice but demanded their own blood.

Jesus, however, had a different view. Did those unfortunate souls deserve to die? Well, as a matter of fact, yes! *But so does everyone else*! Were they any more sinful than the rest of us? No. Actually, they didn't deserve punishment any more or less than anyone, which is where it applies to us still today. We all deserve punishment, and we all deserve to die for our sins. The thing we need to do is stop worrying about other people's sin, and repent of our own so that we won't be ultimately destroyed for them.

So why do bad things happen? Paul says it like this: "For the creation was subjected to frustration, not by its own choice, but by the will of the one who subjected it...." (Rom 8:20) Destruction, suffering, and death are part of the world we live in because it is a fallen world, subjected to sin. This means that tornados, hurricanes, and the hundred other examples of when bad things happen to good people, all happen because the perfect creation was subjected to sin. After all, it ain't heaven yet!
