Brothers and Sisters in the Lord,

Being a Christian can be difficult, especially when the world around us doesn't like Christians. Or the things we stand for.

Last winter, an Episcopal Church in Brookings, OR, filed a lawsuit against the city for violations against its right to practice its religious beliefs. At the heart of the matter was an attempt by the city to restrict the church's practice of feeding homeless people on its property, and limit such activities to two days per week. The church claimed that such restrictions violated its right to practice its religious beliefs. Thankfully, a judge last week agreed with the church.

This case merely highlights the animosity that exists between Christians and non-Christians. We do not need to tax our brains very hard to come up with other examples. Movies and TV shows exhibit the differences on a regular basis, and business practices highlight discrepancies in moral compasses. Even holidays seem to be at odds with each other, as is showcased by this year's Transgender Day of Visibility, a 'holiday' that has been celebrated each March 31st for the past 15 years coinciding with Easter this year!

The phenomenon, however, is not a new one; Christians have faced opposition from the very first.

The book of 1 Peter was written to a group of Christians living in what is now Northern Turkey, who were trying to figure out how to live as Christians in a world that put a lot of pressure on them to go back to the way things were before they professed faith in Jesus Christ.

The question is an interesting one, because of how directly it applies to the culture within the United States. What are we, today in the US, supposed to do in light of the fact that there is so much antiChristian sentiment in the news media, on university campuses, within the military, and on government property?

Peter's instructions to this group of young believers made it clear that one thing we are not supposed to do is to withdraw from society and into our own walls, and avoid all contact with the outside. Nor are we supposed to simply live amongst the world and apart from the church. Peter is clear in his desire for Christians to be part of a community that interacts with outsiders. As someone once said, it is not that Christians live in the world and go to church; it is that they live in the church and go to the world. It is vitally important that Christians stay plugged into their local church, not just because we need to be encouraged and challenged once in a while, but also because the church needs each member to encourage and challenge the rest as well.

The life of a Christian living and working amongst people that reject the Gospel of Christ is not going to be an easy one. Despite what many televangelists would claim, hardship and suffering are probably going to be a part of the Christian life, and from the looks of things in modern culture, it's going to get worse before it gets better. But Peter has insight here as well: there is hope. Our role model. Jesus Christ, experienced opposition and persecution, but he showed us that we can live with hope in a hostile world. He also showed us that we can live with holiness in a hostile world, and make the world a better place. We have hope because Jesus conquered sin and death, and earned us a place with him in glory!
